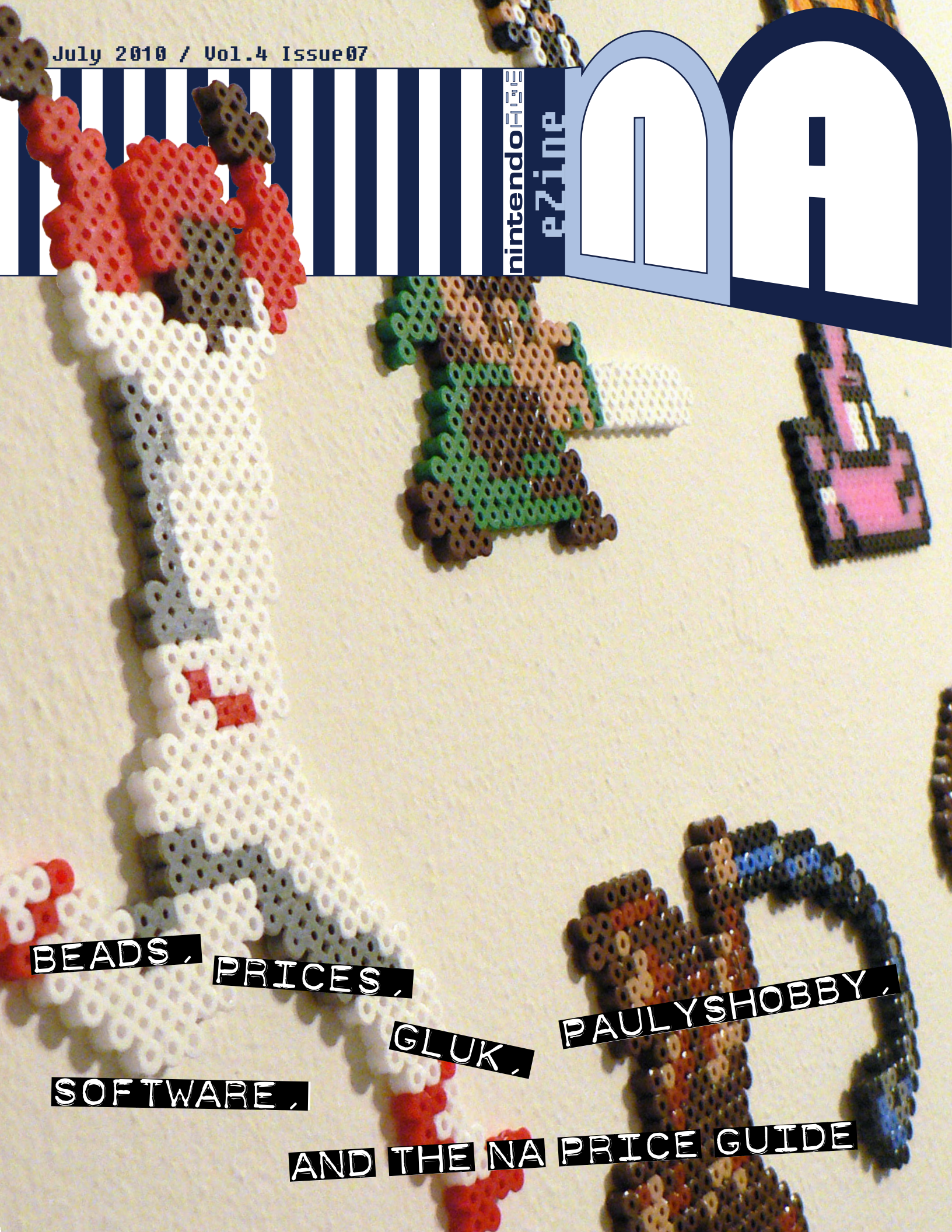

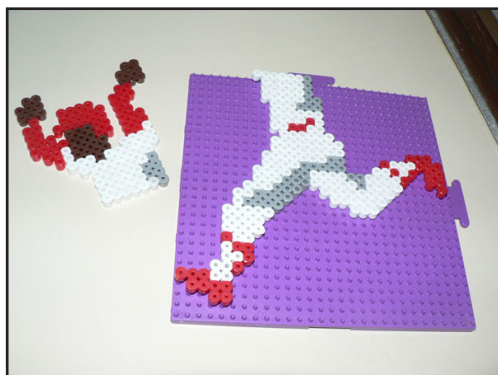

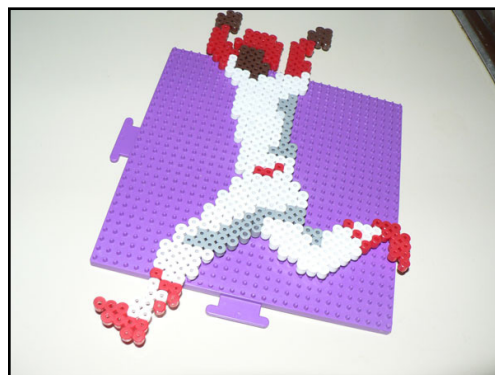

Advanced Bead Art: Seaming



(For a basic guide on Bead Art, check eZine Vol. 3, Issue 10)

Oftentimes, when making bead art, you will find yourself making a piece that is larger than your pegboard. If you've got a ton of cash on hand, you could just buy a ton of connecting pegboards and be fine. However, that money could be well invested in more beads to make more art (or games!). Also, what about the HUGE projects where people try to recreate an entire level of a game? This is where the technique of "seaming" becomes very useful and economical.



Seaming is the term given to melting different pieces of bead art together. While this is a pretty simple technique, doing it wrong can lead to very obvious lines in your bead art and disproportionate melting of the beads. Since you want the piece to look great, here are some simple steps to seam your bead art smoothly and well.

Step 1 – Working with one section, slightly melt all of the individual pieces as usual. Only melt one side, and only melt the pieces enough to where they stick together. You should be able to remove each separate piece from the pegboard without it falling apart. It will be fragile, but it should stick together. When this step is done, you should end up with two or more separate parts of the bead art.

Step 2 – Place two of the corresponding sections lined up on the pegboard where they should melt together, each section half-on/half-off the pegboard. Because you only melted one side, the bottom of the sections should still fit well back onto the pegboards.

Step 3 – Using wax paper and an iron, slightly melt the edges of the pieces together so that they stick together. By doing this, it should become one fragile piece of bead art.

Step 4 – Repeat Step 3 for any other pieces. If one particular section ends up having multiple seams, I suggest starting with the innermost beads and working out. After you complete this step, you should have one very fragile bead art.

Step 5 – Now you can finish your bead art like all other pieces. Flip over the piece, and melt the bottom completely together. After you finish that, flip it back to the front and finish melting that side together. Let it cool down under a book or something and you should end up with a large solid bead art piece to display for yourself.

Seaming can be really useful and is a great technique to use in many situations. If you do it right, no lines should be visible and the beads should melt evenly together. It's also really obvious when people do it incorrectly and it isn't much fun having a large bead art project look sub par. Following these steps should help you end up with a nice looking large piece of bead art to display!





MY GLUK QUEST IN WORDS



In 2008 not many collectors knew about Gluk, an unlicensed NES game producer operating in Spain. Some of us thought they were pirates, me included! When I realized (thanks to some members here on NA, particular Speedy_NES) they were a “true” unlicensed distributor, I knew I have to get them all as my collection goal is to have all NES PAL releases. Overnight my master list raised from 382 games to 400 titles!

The Gluk games came in two different cart plastics, and with two different box designs. 12 titles came in Caltron-style cases, and the other 6 in Micro Genius ones (black). The titles that were released in Caltron game packs had dark green stripes on the box front, with a darker background. The others came in boxes with light green stripes, and a white background. The sole exception is “Gluk the Thunder Warrior,” this one has a dark-striped box but was produced in a black Micro Genius case.

Label variants show up only on the Caltron-style releases. There are 3 types known – the earliest variant is a large Gluk Label placed OVER a Caltron label (i.e. Skate Boy). The second type is a large label with no Caltron label beneath (i.e. La Alfombra Magica)

The last variant is a half-size label (think Famicom-cartridge-style) that appears on Booky Man and a few others.

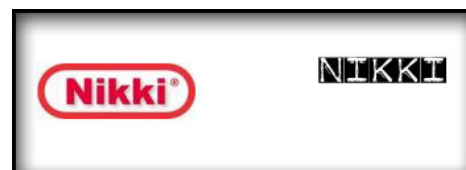
In addition to the Spanish-released cartridges, one Skate Boy cart I acquired came from Scandinavia. As you can see it came with the original Caltron Label. I can’t verify if all Gluk titles in Caltron game packs were released in Scandinavia but there were at least two: the NA database includes Magic Carpet 1001 (La Alfombra Magica). I can’t confirm whether they came in boxes, or as cart-only.

The first boxed Gluk I bought in late 2007 was F-15 City War for a BIN of 25EUR, and the most expensive was Volley Ball which I won for 230.49EUR in a bidding war with our valued Breavheart. The other boxed titles cost me roughly between 70 and 130EUR apiece. While hunting them down, I noted that some are far more scarce than others. The last four I had to hunt for to complete my set were “El Bloque Magico,” “Skate Boy,” “La Guerra Del Golfo,” and “La Gran Aventura Submarina.”

I am still missing the manual for “Gluk The Thunder Warrior,” which is notably the only

Gluk release WITH a manual! All other titles have the gameplay information printed on the back of the box. There was also a promo pin that came attached to the box, but to date I’ve never seen this in anyone’s collection. Fortunately for me, I’m not that picky when it comes to manuals and pack-in gimmicks, so I consider my Gluk mission to be accomplished!

I would consider the rarest Gluk games to be “Adan y Eva” and the other four aforementioned titles. I’ve only seen complete copies once at auction in the past two years. Titles like Volley Ball, Policeman and Puzzle are scarce, but I’ve seen these titles about 3 times at auction in as much time. Others like Corre Benny, La Alfombra Magica, El Destructor, Tanque, El Monstruo del los Globos, just to name few, can be tracked down much more easily. They pop up frequently on the Spanish eBay, and I’ve also seen them for sale right here on NA.

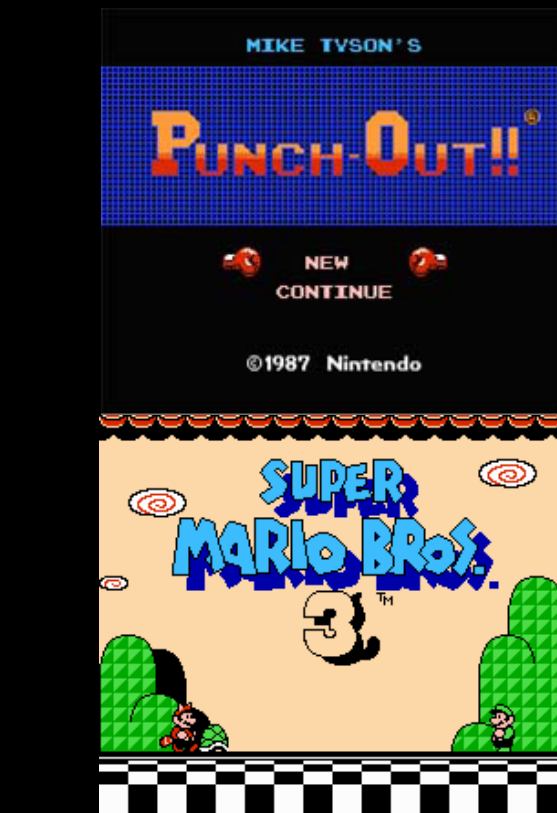
PAULYSHOBBY'S TOP 5:

Collection Tracking Program



Do you keep a list of every game you own? If you are like most of us, the answer is yes. Now the question is, how do you track them if you have multiple systems. Yes the NA collection tool is GREAT, but only for Nintendo-brand games. What if you are like me and collect Intellivision, Atari, Sega, TG-16, or even systems as obscure as the Action Max? You might try the software I discovered years ago at Collectorz.com.

The software available at <http://www.collectorz.com/game/> allows you to keep an up-to-date list of all your games and customize any info you would want. In this article I am briefly going to talk about the features I use most, as there are SO many possible ways to customize the system. I only use (and will only write about) the standard edition, but I'll also note that there is a Pro edition upgrade that allows many more features such as a UPC barcode scanner.

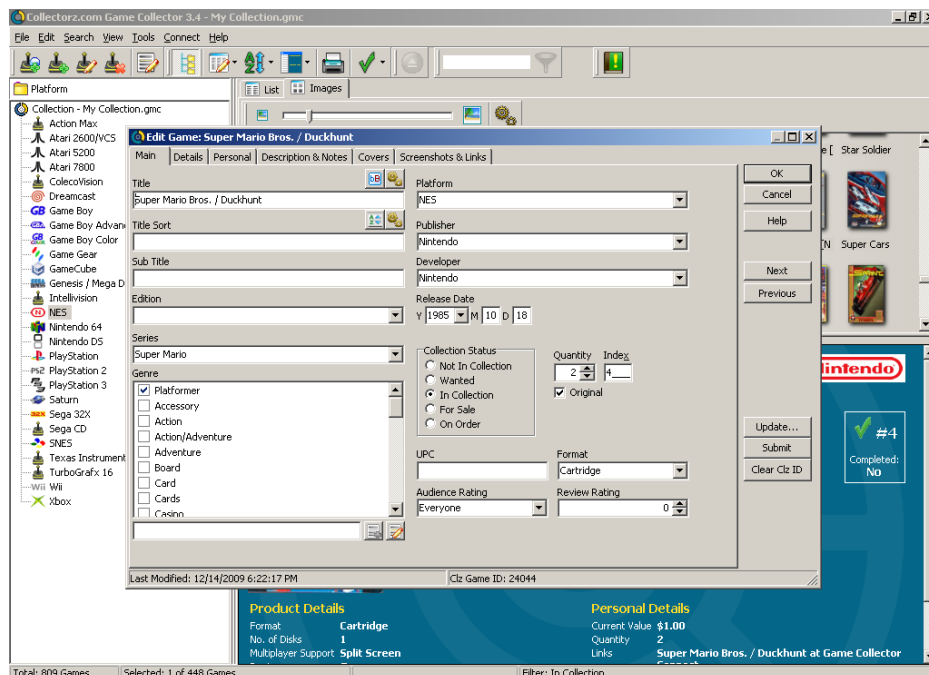
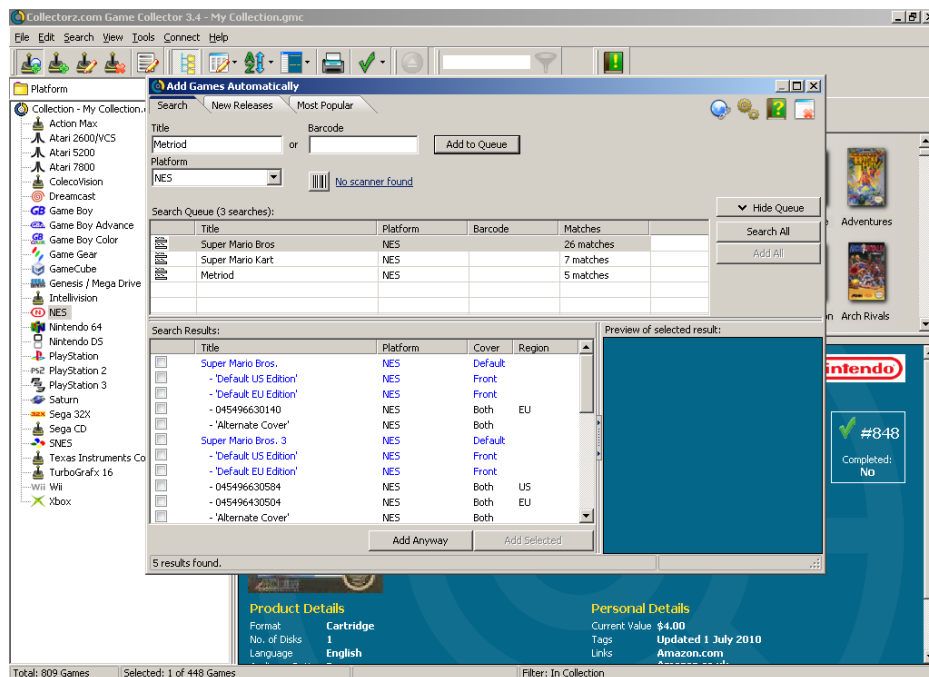
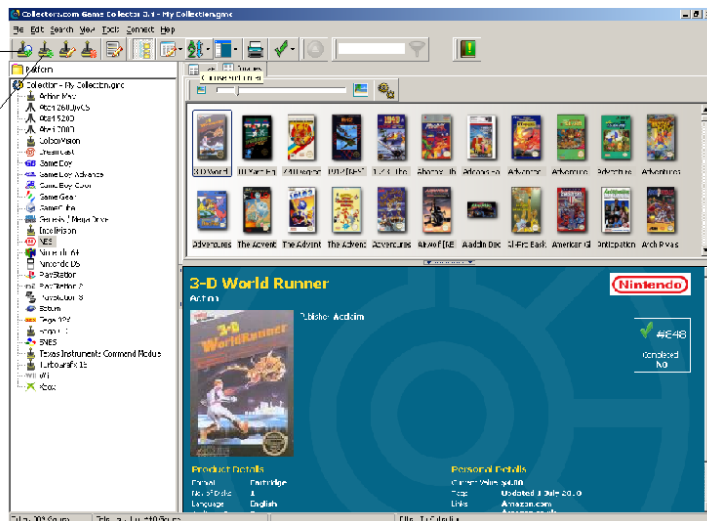
First off we should start with the "Add Games" buttons on the Main screen. I usually use the "Add Games Automatically" since 95% of games are already loaded on the database. Most games will only take a few clicks and the program will automatically search and add them to your collection. I have however found a few NES games that were not loaded in the database so I had to use the "Add Games Manually" button. It is essentially the same thing, but takes longer since you have to enter all the relevant information yourself.

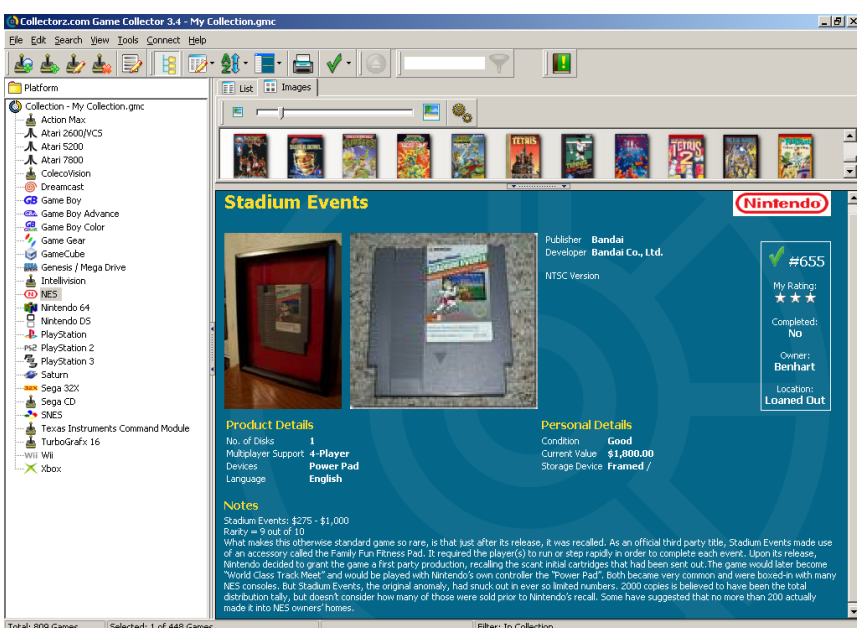
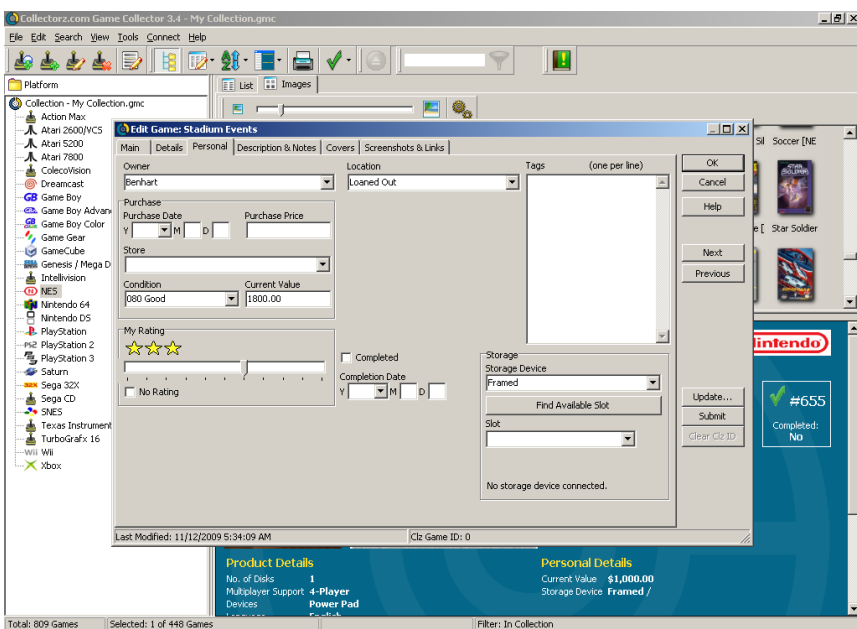
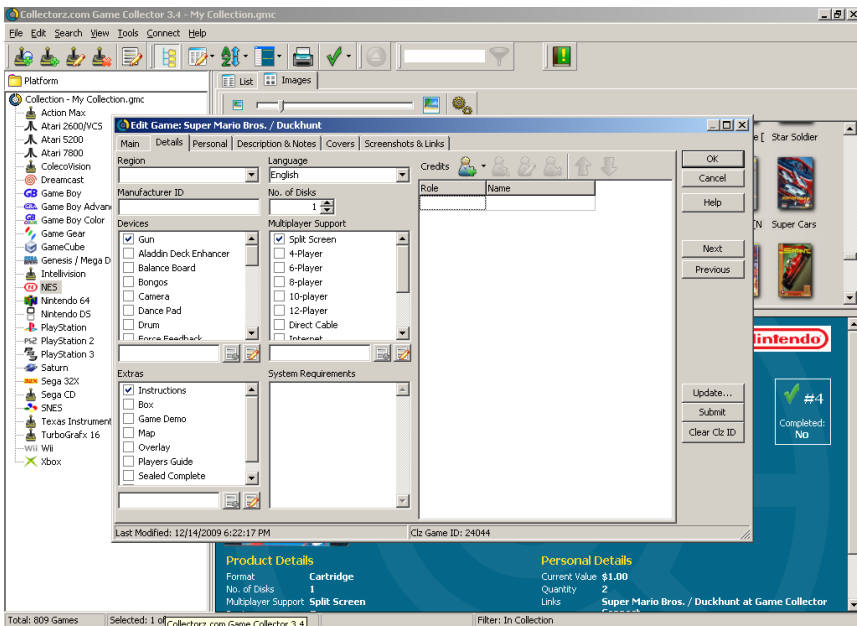
Once you click the "Add Games Manually" button, you a helpful search engine will pop up. This is where you type in the name of the game (or games) you want to search for. Once you have searched, you get to select which version/copy you actually want to add to your collection. It also shows in blue which games you already have in your collection. This cross-check is a handy little feature so you don't double list any carts. Add your selected game and you are off to the next step.

This should send you back to the main screen where you can now double click your game and begin editing all of your personal details. This is also the same screen you'll see if you "Add Games Manually". This pop up is where I do the meat and potatoes of my organization. Across the top you can see there are multiple tabs, such as Main, Details, Personal, Description Notes, Covers, Screenshots and Links. I'm only going to focus on a few commonly-used ones.

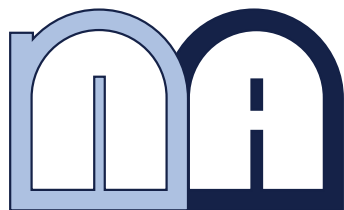
The Main tab lets you edit things like the game title, platform, publisher, etc. You get the idea from the pictures. Next is the Details tab, where I track things like controllers needed and any extras I have: boxes, instructions, maps or players guides. All of these features are FULLY CUSTOMIZABLE for what ever you want. CIB? Sealed? Vaus Controller? You can add them all. Next is the Personal tab. I use this mostly to track the value of my games, but you can also list things like purchase price, completion date and storage location. I generally don't use many of those since I own all of my games and keep them in the same place. If you would like you can also give the game a star rating and write a little memo. The other tabs let you make additional notes about the game, and you can even change the cover pictures. You can actually display the front and back cover of the game if you'd like.

Once you are done editing in all of the above tabs, your game will now show up in your collection with all of the info on its main page. The program will assign a collection number, and list all your info.

That's about it! It may seem like a lot of work to track and load games, but once you use it for a few games, you will realize how quick and easy it is to keep track of all of your games. There are soooo many other features that I did not want to bore you with like the search/filter option, screen layouts, sort orders and even print options. You can play with those features on your own. Every possible tab is fully customizable to the way you want it. I feel it is very user friendly.

There are a few downsides to the software. Yes, it does cost \$30 US. This is a bummer, but nothing is free (except the free trial download, be warned you are limited on the number of games, so choose wisely). You have to download to a specific computer and can not transfer the program. I have tried multiple times to save everything on a flash drive so I can move it from one computer to another, but I've always missed something and I lose some info. Maybe if you download to a flash drive from the start, it would work. Rumor has it that I can get my info transferred if my computer dies, but have not figured out how to do this yet. Also, some of the preloaded pictures of the covers are not the best quality.

If you collect games for multiple consoles and want a clean, organized way to track them all, I strongly suggest checking out this software. It has been very helpful for me over the past 5 years and made my collecting more fun and organized. I am not the most computer savvy user and a program like this is perfect for me. I think it was definitely worth the \$30 I had to pay to download it.
